There is a giant panel over the orchestra platform which reflected the sound back, so the audience can hear clearly. If they were having a rock concert they would put it away, also they will shut the curtains, because the sound would be coming out of speakers. All the walls were painted to look like sedimentary rock, and also the lights were hanging down to look like stalactites which are orange. 


Arts Centre Tour – Fairfax Theatre


