BPANGERANG CULTURAL ARTEFACTS

We learnt about how thin or small their shields were. Or how useful they can be like making a friction fire. There was lots of artefacts, including three different boomerangs. The killer boomerang, you would throw it near and miss then the kangaroo turns around and you throw a spear at the kangaroo. The returning boomerang you would throw it at small birds and then there is the "strange" boomerang that you don't throw. There was also an old phone that you would spin around on a piece of string and it made a loud car sound (because of its shape). This let people know if you were entering their land. They used tree sap to make resin that they would use to make axes and for the head they would sharpen a greenstone with sand stone. A green stone was worth 2 possum cloaks. There was 40 possum skins in one cloak. By Zac and Robert.


